### SPS General Update:

Don Mayle informed the group about Senate Bill 844 concerning drunk driving penalties, which remains inactive in committee. As available, more information will be sent to the group. Matt Lyle provided an update on the continuing resolution, active until December 20<sup>th</sup>. There is currently about \$35.1M of obligation authority divided among Trunkline, Local RTF and Non-RTF pots. More obligation authority is expected following the adoption of an additional continuing resolution or appropriations bill. Also, FY 2025 and 2026-2029 estimates have been updated in JobNet.

### 2020 NFC Review:

David Fairchild reported a productive preliminary meeting with FHWA, as well as plans for distributing guidance materials, including NFC maps for each county. The 2020 Statewide NFC Review is estimated to begin in February 2025, a more detailed schedule to come.

## Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement (CMAQ) Program Interim Guidance

2024 CMAQ Interim Guidance was published in the <u>Federal Register on November 6, 2024</u> and is available for public comment until January 6, 2025.

## Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (NPRM): Asset Management Plan; Management and Monitoring Systems that propose changes to 23 CFR 515. [FR 2024-26200]

This NPRM proposes updates that would amend FHWA's regulations at 23 CFR part 515 governing risk-based asset management plans (AMP), that State DOTs are required to develop under 23 U.S.C. 119(e). Under 23 U.S.C. 119(e), a State DOT is required to develop a risk-based AMP for the National Highway System to improve or preserve the condition of the assets and the performance of the system. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) (Public Law 117-58) amended AMP requirements to require State DOTs to take into consideration extreme weather and resilience within their lifecycle cost and risk management analyses. (23 U.S.C. 119(e)(4)(D)). The NPRM is also proposing revisions to the AMP regulations to improve clarity and to reduce burden on State DOTs for implementation. ## U.S. Department of Transportation Launches Climate Action Strategy Playbook to Help Communities Across America Reduce Emissions

On Monday, November 25, 2024, the U.S. Department of Transportation is releasing a playbook on research -based climate action strategies for State, Tribal, city, and local governments. The "Climate Strategies That Work" playbook includes 28 climate solutions that can help communities reduce carbon pollution and create a more resilient, sustainable, and accessible transportation system for all Americans.

The "Climate Strategies That Work" playbook emphasizes efficient, convenient, and clean transportation solutions that support safe and economically vibrant communities across the United States. Strategies

span infrastructure investments, technology applications, and policy strategies. These include active transportation, electric vehicles, and freight operational efficiencies for use by rural and urban communities. The strategies are informed by the <u>U.S. National Blueprint for Transportation</u> <u>Decarbonization</u> and include information on achieving greenhouse gas reduction, economic development, and safety benefits, along with implementation funding opportunities and case studies that illustrate the impacts of these strategies in action.

## INVESTING IN AMERICA: Biden-Harris Administration Announces \$172 Million in Grants for 250+ Communities to Make Local Roads Safer

Since 2022, the Safe Streets and Roads or All (SS4A) program has funded projects in more than 1,600 communities, supporting roadway safety for around 75% of the U.S. population Early estimates for the first half of 2024 show that traffic fatalities have declined for more than two years straight

On Friday, November 15, 2024, U.S. Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg announced \$172 million in grants to 257 communities through the Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) program created in President Biden's Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. This is the third and final round of 2024 awards that will be announced this year through the community-guided grant program, which is a key component of the National Roadway Safety Strategy.

Projects selected for funding today include:

• \$4.8 million to the Romulus Fire Department in Michigan to pilot signal preemption systems throughout Wayne County to clear intersections for emergency vehicles as they are responding to 911 calls.

State Departments of Transportation under the Low Carbon Transportation Materials Discretionary Grant Program.

The investments will support continued growth in clean American manufacturing, boosting the competitiveness of clean U.S. industries and the creation of good manufacturing jobs while reducing pollution from the production of concrete, steel, and other bedrock materials of our economy. By catalyzing demand for clean construction materials, the Program complements the Biden-Harris Administration's historic investments to support U.S. manufacturers that are cutting industrial emissions – the source of 30% of U.S. climate pollution.

FHWA Resource Center Training: Introduction to MOVES5 for NEPA, GHG, and SIP/Regional Conformity Emissions Analysis

February 3-6, 2025

### **COURSE OVERVIEW**

1:00 PM - 5:00 PM EST

The purpose of this training is to provide attendees with an overview of EPA's MOVES5 mobile source emissions model. We will cover the functionality of the model, input requirements, output processing, and will address relevant EPA and FHWA guidance documents. The course also includes hands-on exercises that will demonstrate several realistic modeling scenarios applicable to GHG, conformity (regional and project-level), and NEPA analyses.

Who should attend: The workshop is intended for those who will be involved with the development of NEPA, SIP, and regional conformity emissions estimates or will be reviewing such analyses. Participants must have MOVES5 installed on their computer before training begins.
